The graph shows a risk curve that starts at 1:1000 at age 13 and increases to 1:100 at age 49. A horizontal line at 1:1000 represents the cut-off. The area above the cut-off is red, the area between the cut-off and the age risk curve is yellow, and the area below the cut-off is green. A black vertical bar is shown at age 27, indicating the patient's risk level.			The calculated risk for Trisomy 21 (with nuchal translucency) is below the cut off, which indicates a low risk. After the result of the Trisomy 21 test (with NT) it is expected that among 9912 women with the same data, there is one woman with a trisomy 21 pregnancy and 9911 women with not affected pregnancies. The calculated risk by PRISCA depends on the accuracy of the information provided by the referring physician. Please note that risk calculations are statistical approaches and have no diagnostic value! The patient combined risk presumes the NT measurement was done according to accepted guidelines (Prenat Diagn 18: 511-523 (1998)). The laboratory can not be hold responsible for their impact on the risk assessment ! Calculated risks have no diagnostic value!
